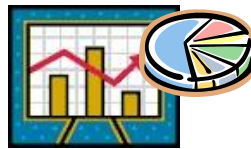
CONSTRUCTION

SURVEYS & GRAPHS



favorites, opinions, physical objects, counts of things, progression/regression/development, trends, factors/cause-effect influencing the author, author's style, setting, characters, and/or theme, map w/ legend

ORAL PRESENTATIONS



debate, panel discussion, lesson, oral report, play, readers' theater script, skit, Oprah Talk Show, impersonation of characters, monologues, Siskel-Roepel Review Duels, Oral Interpretation Performance (Reader's Theater)

DATABASE



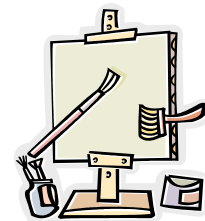
Facts related to a topic or subtopic; information to be sorted,
Data from Library of Congress, Census Data, History Resources, kept in/as files or Microsoft Excel; annotated bibliography

OTHER



forecast, scientific experiment or demonstration, collection, song or other piece of music,
What if Demonstration, advertisement, flip book, learning center, web page, Podcast, Inside the Actor's (Characters' or Author's) Studio
